

EXECUTIVE REPORT

On the 15 December 2023, Artspace opened to the public with a major transformation of The Gunnery building and the opening weekend program attracted a total attendance of 2000 people. Fully supported by the NSW Government with close to \$20M investment, this project has transformed Artspace into a fit-for-purpose, multiplatform, contemporary art space.

The revitalisation of The Gunnery, designed by architects DunnHillam, has restored the original architectural features of the building. The revitalisation offers areas of growth and capacity with the launch of innovative platforms to commission new work and directly support artists through exhibitions and rent-free studio spaces. Importantly, it provides an enhanced experience for visitors. In addition, it supports more sustainable operations with the potential to increase self-generated revenue by testing new philanthropic and commercial opportunities.

The reorientation of the entrance to Forbes Street Plaza has created a highly visible, welcoming, and light-filled space that directly connects Artspace to its local neighborhood, the Art Gallery of NSW and to Sydney Harbour, on Gadigal Country. Key to this is our high-impact public art and landmarking commissioning strategy that includes large-scale, public-facing banners activating the western façade of the building. The new floorplan offers a mix of specialised and flexible spaces across three floors, which are underpinned by enhanced accessibility and functionality. This combined with new and larger programming spaces and a more flexible layout allows Artspace to meet the developing needs of our communities and the ambitious projects we undertake.

Artspace's collaborative approach to working with all key stakeholders has enabled us to realise a shared vision for the building, which not only helps Artspace expand its strategic objectives and artistic programs into the future, but also elegantly engages with the building's heritage. Underpinned by an exclusive 35-year tenancy, Artspace now operates across all three floors of the building for the first time in the organisation's history. This once-in-a-lifetime transformation project is a significant achievement for the arts in Australia and will ensure the Artspace's future in the building for the next generation of custodians.

In the lead up to the reopening, Artspace continued to champion the production and presentation of new work by providing opportunities for artists, writers and other creative practitioners across multiple platforms and contexts. The artistic program was ambitious and expansive actively supporting:

- A creative workforce 120 artists and collectives, and other cultural practitioners; 9 full-time employees, and 47 casual staff across installation and front-of-house
- 1 flagship exhibition the NSW Visual Arts Fellowship (Emerging) presented in partnership with Carriageworks supporting the work of six NSW-based emerging artists
- 1 solo commission with Wiradyuri/Kamilaroi artist Jonathan Jones's *untitled (transcriptions of country)* representing the 10th edition of our Commissioning Series
- 1 publication titled *Jonathan Jones: untitled (transcriptions of country)* with 18 writers commissioned to produce new texts
- 9 presentations of Artspace curated exhibitions Just Not Australian, Mel O'Callaghan's Centre of the Centre and 52 ACTIONS in regional and metropolitan centres across Australia, as part of our national exhibition touring program
- 1 new international presentation of Daniel Boyd's work, *Untitled (24° 10'0.012"N 90°25'0.011"E)* in partnership with Dhaka Art Summit, Bangladesh
- A total attendance of 865,342 people, with 100% of programs being free and accessible

Key financial highlights of the 2023 result include:

- The net operating surplus of the company for the year ended 31st December 2023 was \$123,935 (2022: net operating surplus of \$94,502)
- Total self-generated income from fundraising, philanthropic donations and strategic partnerships has



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increased significantly, by 122% year on year to \$943k (40%), from \$425k (24%) in 2021


- Total expenditure increased year to \$2.2m from \$1.7m in 2022. This is attributed to increased activities and operational requirements associated with The Gunnery reopening. The split between core expenditure 65% and program expenditure 35% shifted in favour of the program expenditure compared to the previous year (67% core expenditure and 33% program expenditure)
- The reopening of The Gunnery was marked by the high-profile solo exhibition with Wiradyuri/ Kamilaroi artist Jonathan Jones titled *untitled (transcriptions of country)*. This was accompanied by a 500-page publication with 18 writers commissioned to produce new texts. In the lead up to the reopening Artspace continued to directly invest in artists, writers and other creative practitioners throughout the year, enabling employment, creative development opportunities and the presentation of their work; net program expenditure is \$765k over the previous year's spend in 2022 of \$569
- The surplus of \$124k has increased reserves to \$977k. This includes accumulated contributions to reserves from COVID assistance in 2021 and 2020, the net benefit of \$469k (\$194k in 2021 and \$275k in 2020), deemed by the Board as resilience funds. While above Creative Australia's recommendations (minimum level of reserves equalling net assets is 20% of total expenditure), the company maintains reserves of 44% of annual expenses (2022: reserves at 50%), to be expended according to the Board approved strategic priorities for The Gunnery expansionary plans following the reopening in late 2023
- The 15-year lease commitment of \$2m for The Gunnery building has been recognised on the Balance Sheet in accordance with AABS 16

Our achievements were due to a solid internal team and an extensive network of individuals and organisations whose dedication and commitment have enabled Artspace to succeed. We thank Artspace's Board of Directors; our dedicated staff; the many artists, curators and peers who participate in our exhibitions and programs; and our corporate, government and private supporters who value the work that we do.

We'd especially like to thank Andrew Cameron, Artspace's Chair for his leadership role over the past six years, especially his unwavering commitment and drive for the redevelopment of The Gunnery. We would also like to thank Kathy Bail and Taloi Havini, outgoing Board Directors, for their diligence, commitment, and enthusiasm in supporting Artspace.

In addition, we would like to note the significant contributions and outstanding achievements from team members that Artspace farewelled in 2023, who are now taking their next career steps, Development Manager Alanna Irwin, and Operations and Production Manager Court Williams.

On a more personal note, we would like to acknowledge the valued contributions of our colleague Rachael Helmore, Associate Curator – Studios, Learning and Outreach whose practice brought together diverse forms of artmaking and collaborations with the local community to support an ambitious and lively program of events such as the Woolloomooloo Parade.

The NSW Visual Arts Fellowship (Emerging) is offered by the NSW Government through Create NSW to enable a visual artist at the beginning of their career to undertake a self-directed program of professional development. The fellowship has been presented by Artspace since 1997.

This exhibition engaged with the external environment through to the internal realm of the psyche, considering notions of play and ritual; care, Country, and intergenerational knowledge-sharing; desire, sexuality, and the body.

Jonathan Jones: untitled (transcriptions of country)

15 Dec 2023 – 11 Feb 2024 Artspace

Based on research undertaken in Australia and France, this exhibition considered the colonial transportation, trade and translation of Australian native plants and animals, as well as Australian Aboriginal portraits, objects and music, and their associated knowledges, by examining the 1800–1803 French expedition under the command of Captain Nicolas Baudin.

The French explorers amassed extraordinary collections. Countless plants and animals, along with the largest known ensemble of Sydney Aboriginal objects, were taken back to France and installed at the Château de Malmaison. But with the demise of Napoléon, the exact fate of the Australian animals is unknown, the significant collections were largely lost or forgotten, and the story remains untold.

Jones presented a collection of collaborative elements – a series of embroideries that transcribe the plant specimens collected in Sydney, a set of wreaths and historical portraits, a moving image work, soundscape, and planting installation. These artworks ponder the process of translation and how concepts, practices and stories distort as they move away from their homelands and caretakers. The artist explained: "I'm curious about how we come to terms with objects that were collected and are now lost to the archive; how these objects can morph into new forms of dialogue, become tools of reciprocity and repatriation within the framework of decolonisation."

As the world's refugee crisis continues to grow and displacement dominates our contemporary experience, understanding how Indigenous concepts, practices and stories can be translated across cultures is more than ever relevant. The exhibition *untitled (transcriptions of country)* spoke to the way seeds can flourish in new environments, to how Aboriginal understanding of Country and respectful sharing of knowledge can connect people and communities

Each year, we offer ten rent-free studios which support and facilitate the professional development of artists at all stages of their careers, from emerging to established.


The One Year Studio Program provides artists with the space to work freely, test new ideas, engage with each other and connect with our national and international peer networks and audiences. This program provides much-needed space for experimentation and the development of new work. It offers critical support through advocacy and dialogue with Artspace staff and other national and international arts professionals that have positive and direct impacts on the artists' careers.

There were 174 applications received through the Open Call in August 2023. The applications were assessed by Artspace staff and two representatives from the Board of Directors, Mikala Dwyer and Amanda Love.



Ideas Platform

The Ideas Platform is a project space adjacent to the Main Galleries that serves as a testing ground for experimental, open-ended, and expanded creative practice. With a focus on process as much as (if not more than) outcome, it is underpinned by the simple concept that 'if you have an idea, we have a platform.' The Ideas Platform presents a diverse calendar of projects each year including curated exhibitions, performances, independent publishing, interventions, workshops, screenings, research projects, symposia and socially engaged initiatives.

LOUPE

15 Dec 2023 – 11 Feb 2024 Artspace

Debra Phillips' *LOUPE* was the inaugural of three artist-led archive-focused projects presented in the Ideas Platform. The series offers artists an open invitation to engage with and respond to material across the breadth of Artspace's extensive 40-year archive. Phillips has a longstanding association with Artspace, having had a solo exhibition in 1990 at our original premises at 11 Randle Street, Surry Hills, and again in 1993 at The Gunnery building. In her practice, Phillips often explores systems of knowledge and their intersection with daily life to generate questions around history-making, economics, geography, and politics, with an interest in interrogating public and private archives and collections.

LOUPE featured 22 photographs looking out over Central Station taken by Phillips from her studio in 1984. There is an innate sense of transience in the representation of concentrated and repeated processes of looking out at the world; of situating oneself in a time and place; here and there, then, and now.

These photographic works were accompanied by *LOUPE*, a 24-page newspaper style publication produced by the artist, which gathers visual material drawn from or responding to the first two years of Artspace's public activities. Ranging from the first exhibition A Different Perspective in 1983 to Koori Art '84, *LOUPE* documented a selection of Artspace's archival material including slides, video stills, audio cassette cases, photographs, books, catalogues, and posters.

Banner Series

The Banner Series brings a rotating series of artworks to the exterior of The Gunnery building. The commissioned banners are a site for artists to contemplate, disrupt and experiment, providing a lively, constantly changing enhancement to our built environment. The highly visible banners with sightlines to the city provide a strong connection to Woolloomooloo and surrounding suburbs and broadcast Artspace as a cultural destination. The series includes three artist commissions each year.

Dennis Golding: Colouring Memory

15 Dec 2023 – 7 Mar 2024

For Artspace's inaugural Banner Series, Kamilaroi and Gamilaraay artist Dennis Golding created a new work inspired by his childhood and urban upbringing in Sydney. The artist grew up in Redfern where, like Woolloomooloo, detailed iron lacework adorns the fences and balconies of the Victorian-era terrace homes in the area.

One side of his banner commission *Colouring Memory* depicted an original lacework panel, a vestige of Australia's colonial history and the imported trade of iron-mongering. In his broader practice, Golding has adapted the structural form of these panels to reference the tradition of First Nations shield-making, often etched with totemic figures and landscapes.

On the opposite banner, the artist fashioned a contemporary motif that revealed his background in graphic design. Golding's colourful floral shield deliberately alludes to European ideas of heraldry, but is overlaid with Indigenous Australian plants including Gymea lily, lilly pillies, eucalypt, banksia, and flannel flower. Plant life evokes memories of place, home, and Country. Golding asserts Indigenous history and knowledge, metaphorically (and artistically) dismantling the fence – a colonial imposition that implies ownership and separation.



International Partnerships

Working collaboratively with international peer institutions enables Artspace to support artists from Australia and internationally to develop new work, pursue new directions and make their most ambitious projects to date. These co-commissions exemplify our commitment to international partnerships, which are crucial to growing professional networks, and increasing visibility and momentum for Australian artists.




Artspace's third major co-commission with the Dhaka Art Summit, Bangladesh, presented Kudjla and Gangalu artist Daniel Boyd's large-scale, site-specific iteration of his work *Untitled (37°33'51.2" N 126°58'24.4" E)*. This work expanded upon Boyd's work which was presented as part of 경로를 재탐색합니다 *UN/LEARNING AUSTRALIA* at the Seoul Museum of Art (SeMA) in 2021, co-curated by Artspace and SeMA.

Boyd's work explored the ways in which Indigenous people and histories are seen, interpolated, and represented within a western or colonial vision. In this site-specific window installation, circular cut outs re-framed the views outside, transforming them into a web of illuminated dots, and spilling new light patterns across the gallery.

Alongside nine days of exhibitions, talks, performances and workshops, the Dhaka Art Summit 2023 (DAS 2023), titled বন্যা/Bonna, considered the ways in which humans form, inherit, and establish vocabularies to understand the world around us, and the mistranslations that can ensue when we try to apply singular terms to unfamiliar contexts.

Encounters returned to Art Basel in Hong Kong for the sixth time, curated by Alexie Glass-Kantor. Featuring 14 artworks by Carlos Aires, David Altmejd, Siah Armajani, Awol Erizku, Gimhongsok, Mella Jaarsma, Jaffa Lam, Nabuqi, Stanislava Pinchuk, Shubigi Rao, Inga Svala Thórsdóttir & Wu Shanzhuan, Danh Võ, Trevor Yeung, and Hsu Yunghsu, *Encounters* is a unique platform that transcends the traditional art fair stand by presenting large-scale sculptural installations.

Bringing together nineteen Australian artists across generations and media, *Just Not Australian* explored the origins and implications of contemporary Australian nationhood. This timely thematic show highlighted the sensibilities of larrikinism, satire, and resistance in examining the presentation and representation of Australian

Just Not Australian engages with the moral and ethical undertones of the loaded rejoinder 'un- Australian' – a pejorative now embedded in our national vocabulary that continues to be used to further political agendas and to spread nationalistic ideals of what it means to be Australian. Far from a simple comparison, a consideration of what's not Australian ultimately leads to questions of what is, and the artists in *Just Not Australian* consider this in detail.

The national tour of this exhibition commenced in 2020, coinciding with the 250th anniversary of Captain Cook's voyage to Australia. This timing provided a poignant opportunity to scrutinise Australia's colonial past and the intricate challenges involved in presenting and defining national identity.

Tracey Moffatt and Gary Hillberg - Montages: The Full Cut 1999-2015

Montages: The Full Cut, 1999–2015 presents the full suite of eight montage films by artist Tracey Moffatt and collaborator Gary Hillberg. Presented together for the first time, the exhibition spans 16 years of the pair's collaborative practice and includes their most recent work, *The Art (2015)*.

The exhibition is an ode to cinema and to the cinematic form, offering unprecedented insight into the stereotypes that populate our collective cultural imagination. In this suite of montages, Moffatt and Hillberg source footage from Hollywood films, tapping into the humour and pathos of universally shared subjects like art, revolution, love, and destruction

Mel O'Callaghan - Centre of the Centre

Mel O'Callaghan's solo exhibition *Centre of the Centre* was a major commission that traced the origins of life and its regenerative forces, iterated through video, performance, and sculpture. *Centre of the Centre* premiered at Artspace in 2019 and began its national tour in 2021.

Australian-born, Paris-based O'Callaghan works across film, performance, installation, and painting. *Centre of the Centre* was O'Callaghan's first large scale exhibition in an Australian public institution. The exhibition comprised three distinct yet interrelated works – a large-scale video work, a performative aspect and selected glass sculptures.

The catalyst for this body of work was one small mineral given to the artist by her grandfather, renowned mineralogist Albert Chapman. The mineral contains a small pocket of water, possibly millions of years old, which holds traces of the elemental forces responsible for all life on earth. Inspired by the potentialities and extreme conditions within this primordial liquid, the exhibition submerges the audience in a highly visceral experience through sensory breathing techniques and experiential performance.

Mel O'Callaghan's Centre of the Centre was curated and developed by Artspace and toured nationally with Museums & Galleries of NSW. Centre of the Centre is co-commissioned by Le Confort Moderne, Poitiers; Artspace, Sydney; and The University of Queensland Art Museum, Brisbane. With Commissioning Partners Andrew Cameron AM & Cathy Cameron and Peter Wilson & James Emmett; and Lead Supporter, Kronenberg Mais Wright. The development and presentation of Centre of the Centre is supported by the Fondation des Artistes, Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, and the US National Science Foundation. 52 ACTIONS features works from 52 Australian artists and collectives across generations, geographies, and cultural backgrounds. Working across a wide variety of media, together these artists highlight the diversity, complexity, and dynamism of contemporary Australian art. Supported by Museums & Galleries of NSW, Artspace is currently delivering a national exhibition tour through partnerships with peer institutions across Australia.

52 ACTIONS is grounded in art as action, exploring and reflecting upon what art is, what it can do within the gallery and far beyond: art as a political motivator, a cultural transmitter, a means for understanding, a tool for shifting perspectives, holding memory, bridging divides, and inciting change. These ideas are intimately connected with the role of the artist, from facilitator to provocateur, creator to witness.

Guided by the local, the artists' actions speak to critical global concerns including systemic discrimination, climate change, forced migration and colonial legacies. Notions of freedom are ever present, as are First Nations' perspectives, the importance of family and community, and speculations about our shared future.

The exhibition has evolved from Artspace's online commissioning platform of the same name, which from 2020 to 2021 presented new works each week by the 52 participants on Artspace's website and standalone Instagram @52artists52actions. In close collaboration with each venue, the exhibition brings together a selection of these works and others in an adaptive, site-specific tour that is responsive to each unique context.


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



Learning and Outreach

Artspace plays an important role as a community resource, connecting audiences with the social, cultural, and political impacts of contemporary art. The redevelopment of The Gunnery provides opportunity for the expansion of Artspace's learning programs, thereby enhancing onsite access, and facilitating the translation of artistic practice into social connections and community wellbeing.

Our partnerships with tertiary institutions National Art School (NAS) and University of New South Wales, Art and Design (UNSW) enable students to interact directly with artists, exhibitions, and contemporary practices, offering a valuable cultural resource. The Postgraduate Professional Practice Seminar held at NAS in August saw Senior Curator Talia Linz and Associate Curator Sarah Rose present a lecture on the Australian arts ecology, focused on navigating galleries, grants, and opportunities for artists.

As an active member of the Woolloomooloo Working Group, Artspace collaborated with local social service providers to facilitate community access and participation. The monthly community barbecues – Woolloomoolove – offer a unique opportunity for participating service providers to directly engage with community members in a relaxed setting, fostering a spirit of collaboration. These gatherings serve to activate public spaces while ensuring the creation and upkeep of safe, inclusive environments where families can come together to appreciate and celebrate our diverse community.

Artspace also collaborated with community participants and other local service providers on the Woolloomooloo Parade in May. This site-specific community event was developed and realised by local people to celebrate their stories and lives. The parade theme – The Nest – was a rich metaphor for the Woolloomooloo community as a place where people are nurtured, feel safe, and connect with each other.

For the reopening of The Gunnery, Artspace facilitated a ribbon-making workshop with WEAVE Youth & Community Services in November 2023. This was in collaboration with Kamilaroi and Gamilaraay artist Dennis Golding, the inaugural artist engaged for the Banner Series. In collaboration with a group of 15 young people from the Woolloomooloo community they designed and created a unique ribbon that was cut as part of the reopening ceremony with Uncle Charles Madden.





Archive

The Franco Belgiorno-Nettis Archive is now housed in a purpose-built space accessible to the public. It contains hundreds of books and catalogues from Artspace's 40-year history, as well as exhibition, event and performance invitations, flyers and posters, photographic and audio-visual documentation, and other materials documenting the evolution of Australia's arts ecology. The archive reflects Sydney's contemporary arts community through the lens of Artspace, bearing witness to societal issues from feminism, environmentalism, and sexuality through to cultural diversity, Indigenous rights, and recognition. It documents milestone projects and relationships with many artists who have made important contributions to art history nationally and internationally.

In 2023, Artspace launched the Archive with a curated presentation featuring printed matter. The display included small print publications, posters, and ephemera from 1983. Spanning numerous key moments, this material provided a important documentation of Artspace's history.



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Communications

During Artspace's transformation significant changes across our digital and physical communication touch points were implemented. While we continued to strengthen our partnerships with exhibitions and programs offsite, Artspace reopened in December 2023 which led to a tremendous response from local and international communities.

Leading with the exterior of The Gunnery, Artspace commissioned artist Dennis Golding (Kamilaroi, Gamilaraay) for the new Banner Series, providing high visibility along with sightlines to the city. Artspace's visual identity provided accessibility to our audience through the reorientation to our entrance and clear wayfinding throughout The Gunnery building.

Our website had steady growth with more than 52,000 unique session visits, our social media channel audiences had consistent growth with Facebook followers at 18,000 with an increase in Instagram followers to over 26,000 followers. Along with our social media platforms, Artspace's email subscriber base has also experienced growth to 12,577 subscribers with a significant increase to the average open rate of 46% of all mail outs.

Artspace's new visual identity was renewed across all digital and physical communication channels. A focus on enhancing our digital infrastructure enabled the renewed website to provide for an accessible, mobile friendly and dynamic touch point for all users. Artspace softly launched its latest commissioning platform, *52 ACTIONS* online alongside digital access to the Franco Belgiorno-Nettis Archive encouraging stronger user engagement with our artistic program.

Artspace retained strong interest and visibility in media nationally and internationally. Our national media reach and visibility has expanded significantly including features across: Art Monthly Australasia, Art Collector, Art Guide, Art Asia Pacific, National Indigenous Times, Ocula, Eastside FM radio, Fbi Radio, ABC Radio, Sydney Morning Herald, SBS Online, Alive 90.5 FM, Artshub, ArtWank Podcast, Timeout. While our international features included: Art Basel, Art Asia Pacific, Almanac, Artdependence, Artnet News, Bloomberg Citylab, Ocula, South China Morning Post, Style Chosun and The Art Newspaper.

Eastside Radio, 2SER, Arts Hub and Coconet TV, New Zealand, covered the recipient of the 2022 NSW Visual Arts Fellowship, Cook Island-Australian artist Morgan Hogg, in partnership with Create NSW and Carriageworks. As 52 ACTIONS continued its national tour to Wangaratta Art Gallery, Jervis Bay Maritime Museum & Gallery, and Singleton Arts + Cultural Centre, with coverage including Wangarrata Chronicle, ABC Radio and Art Guide. The final destination of touring exhibition *Just Not Australian*, at Museum of Sydney was well received with radio coverage on Eastside Radio and 2SER. The opening celebrations over one weekend brought over 2400 visitors onsite for the opening of Jonathan Jones' *untitled (transcriptions of country)*, Debra Phillips' *LOUPE* and a full series of public programs.












PHILANTHROPY

In 2023, Artspace attracted unprecedented philanthropic support exceeding its annual fundraising target of \$800,000. With over 36% of our income raised through philanthropic support from individuals and foundation, the generosity of our benefactors donating to Artspace's Transformation Campaign has a huge impact on our capacity to support the production and presentation of contemporary art. These donations have enabled us to support the creative development and commissioning of new work, and to share this work through international presentations and our national exhibition touring program. It has also enabled us to invest in the future of our artistic program through learning and outreach programs, as well as skills development and mentorships for emerging artists, curators, writers, and other cultural practitioners.

In 2023, the investment from our benefactors enabled us to:

- Build capacity through our Transformation Campaign to support the next five years of the artistic program, including direct support for the Associate Curator and Executive Assistant's base salary and creating a significant professional development opportunity for an emerging curator in the first five years of their practice
- Commission and present new work by artists to inspire and challenge audiences, including Jonathan Jones', untitled (transcriptions of country); Debra Phillips' LOUPE presented in the Ideas Platform; and Dennis Golding's Colouring Memory for the Banner Series
- Support risk, experimentation, and the creation of new work for ten Sydney-based artists with the relaunch of the One Year Studio Program
- Support professional development opportunities for emerging artists through curatorial support, mentorship, and dialogue, to create and present their work to audiences. These opportunities included the 2023 NSW Visual Arts Fellowship (Emerging)
- Extend our global networks and capacity for partnership-building through the relaunch of the International Curators Program
- Increased access and participation for learning and community-building programs to expand engagement with schools, communities, artists, and visitors
- Complete the final stages of The Gunnery transformation project to develop a physical Archive accessible to the public for research and scholarship





CULTURAL INFRASTRUCTURE

Artspace reopened The Gunnery building in Woolloomooloo to the public on 15 December 2023 after being closed for two-and-a-half years for refurbishment. This investment, fully funded by the NSW Government, has helped maximise the space and create state-of-the-art facilities producing an architectural and cultural landmark where people, art and ideas come together in a vibrant, cultural precinct. Award-winning architects DunnHillam applied 'a philosophy of loose fit, long life and have designed a flexible, open, and accessible home for contemporary art overlooking Sydney Harbour'. This once-in-a-generation project is a significant cultural development for the city of Sydney, transforming Artspace into a fit-for-purposes, multi-platformed, contemporary art space. This revitalised heritage-listed building brings together contemporary art and architecture in new ways, with dynamic exhibition and studio spaces, site-specific works by leading Australian and international artists, and a place for audiences to enjoy.

The transformation of The Gunnery has enabled the following benefits:

- Artspace's expanded use and access to the building, increasing from two floors to all three floors, offering a more flexible layout to support programming and operations
- · Restoration and upgrade of all three floors, including universal access throughout the building
- Reorientation of the entrance to Forbes Street Plaza, providing greater connection with the local
 neighbourhood in tandem with a new landmarking commissioning strategy that includes large-scale, publicfacing banners activating the western facade of the building and strengthening our vibrant cultural precinct
- Enlarged exhibition galleries on the ground floor and additional project spaces to support new work throughout the building, and a new double height void for expanded exhibition capacity and large-scale installations
- New facilities on the first floor including a Learning Studio supporting learning and outreach initiatives with
 enhanced digital capabilities; a Multipurpose space that is acoustically sound with a sprung-floor supporting
 the development of new work, performances, public programs, and venue hire to attract new audiences; and
 an accessible Archive to support research and scholarship
- Three new artist studios offered rent free through Artspace's One Year Studio Program, increasing the number of studios from seven to ten with 24/7 access to the third floor
- Onsite visitation forecasted to increased by 200% by 2028, this includes the capacity to significantly increase student and teacher visits in partnership with the Art Gallery of NSW
- Improved back-of-house facilities including new offices, a catering kitchen to support events, and a
 production workshop with greater functionality
- Renewed critical infrastructure, including the updating of communications, fire safety, digital, HVAC, waste management and security systems


